# Artist writes first children's book

## "Once There Were No Cows"

by Bonnie Mohr (UMW 1982 graduate)

Bonnie Mohr, known for her rural and inspirational paintings, wrote and illustrated her first children's book, "Once There Were No Cows" this fall.

Mohr and her husband, John, own Glenmark Genetics near Glencoe. The farm is also home to Bonnie Mohr Studio.

In her blog, Mohr shared how she had wanted to do a children's book for several years and had been waiting for a good idea.

"During the wee hours of the night, as I was in the studio painting, the idea came, loud and clear," said Mohr. "As I got up to stretch from my work, at about 2 a.m., the idea struck like a bolt of lightning! In my head, the title was announced. I went to the computer, sat down and wrote the story in about an hour. Probably one of the most magical events of my life."

During the next four months she tweaked and revised the story, but in the end, her work led her back to her original words and title with few editing changes. From February to July 2014, she created 16 original oil paintings to accompany the story.

The book debuted in October at World Dairy Expo, where Mohr personalized more than 1,000 books.

Mohr describes the book as a retelling of creation and why God created the cow.

"If you love animals, especially cows, and enjoy books with big pictures and a heartwarming storyline, I think you will share in my excitement for 'Once There Were No Cows,'" Mohr said.

Eight of Mohr's paintings from the book are available as individual prints or as a book/print package.

Mohr describes the book as a celebration and tribute to dairy farmers and their lifestyle.

"It's a reflection of my own journey, too, growing up a dairy farmer's daughter, marrying a dairy farmer, and now raising our family on our own dairy farm," Mohr said.

She describes the book as an inspiration story of "how God came to create the most beautiful and majestic creature — the cow — to help celebrate and support the bond of family and be a foundation for all mankind."

## Lawstuen Awarded 2015 Gopher Dairy Club Golden Graduate

### Lawstuen focused on opening doors for dairy science students

Lawstuen received the University of Minnesota Gopher Dairy Club Golden Graduate Award Feb. 22.

CALMAR, Iowa — People opened doors for Dave Lawstuen during his college career, and he returns the favor for Northeast Iowa Community College students.

"I don't think I'm a great teacher, but I try to be a facilitator to get the kids to realize how good they can be," Lawstuen said.

Lawstuen was honored Feb. 22 as the 2015 Gopher Dairy Club Golden



Graduate.

Humble is how colleagues describe Lawstuen.

Lawstuen admits that talking about himself makes him uncomfortable.

"I was surprised and very honored but I can think of a couple dozen graduates who are more deserving," Lawstuen said. "The U is a very special place for me."

Lawstuen grew up on a registered Holstein farm at Lanesboro, Minn. He was in 4-H and FFA and showed cattle at county and district events and the Minnesota State Fair.

"I got my interest in the industry from those youth programs," Lawstuen said. "I was very naive. I didn't even know what an ACT test was."

He attended the University of Minnesota-Waseca for two years. On the way home from dairy judging in Texas, coach Mary Huff Nelson asked him what he planned to do next.

"She told me I should go to the University of Minnesota," Lawstuen said. "I didn't think I could do that, but she talked me into it. Doors opened."

Lawstuen admits to culture shock when he first went to the St. Paul campus. About four weeks into his first semester, he quit school and returned home because he father was injured in an accident. As he farmed that fall, he realized that he really wanted to earn a college degree.

"When I returned to school in January, my whole attitude had changed," Lawstuen said.

He was involved in dairy judging, active in the fraternity system and a founding member of the Gopher Dairy Club.

Driving back from judging at Harrisburg, Pa., Lawstuen's coach and professor Les Hansen asked what he planned to do after graduation

"He said I should consider graduate school," Lawstuen said. "I'd never even pondered that. He encouraged me, and doors kept opening."

Lawstuen earned a master's degree in animal breeding and genetics with a minor in statistics from the U of M and went to work for Eastern A.I. Cooperative in Ithaca, N.Y.

When he and his wife, Deb, started their family, they had the opportunity to buy his family farm and move back to the Midwest. On a trip home, he saw an advertisement for a dairy herd management instructor at NICC at Calmar.

"It was 50 miles from my house," Lawstuen said. "I didn't even know there was a college at Calmar. He got the job, bought the family farm and moved home.

He'll mark his 20th year at Calmar in August. He and Deb and their two children, Kirstin, 19, and Kyle 18, still live at Lanesboro and have a small registered Angus herd. Kirstin is a sophomore at the University of Minnesota and Kyle, a high school senior, plans to attend the U in the fall.

When Lawstuen arrived at Calmar, the school milked 40 cows in a tie-stall barn.

"With a 40-cow dairy, we couldn't afford more than one employee and that was a struggle on weekends and holidays," Lawstuen said. "I realized this was not unique to the college but was true all through the industry. We started considering modernizing to a 150-cow herd with a free-stall barn and parlor."

The NICC president at the time, Rob Denson, got wind of the idea and he assembled a team — Paul Brown with Iowa State University Extension, Clayton County Extension Director Jim Hosch and Elkader veterinarian Ken Reimer. Richard Ross, at the time co-dean of the ISU College of Agriculture and Veterinary School, also got on board. The meetings led to the creation of the Northeast Iowa Community-Based Dairy Foundation, which opened the center in 2000.

"Things have really grown in dairy science but we also have ag business, beef science and vet tech programs here," Lawstuen said. "Up on campus we have the nation's top John Deere tech program. We've really evolved into a hub for agriculture with dairy as our focal point."

As chair of dairy operations at Iowa's Dairy Center and dairy science faculty, Lawstuen has seen the herd grow to 300 cows. Half are milked by two robots and half go through a traditional parlor.

"The Dairy Foundation Board and the NICC Board have been so supportive," Lawstuen said. "I don't know where you could find anything like it. We are in the class room and in less than five minutes we can be out in the barn looking at three different milking systems — the robots and parallel and herringbone parlors. If we hit a bump in the herd, we can throw on our coats and go look at the ration and do some problem solving."

Lawstuen's goal is that every student who comes into his classroom leaves with more knowledge and enthusiasm.

His students have gone on to become members of cooperative boards, school boards, leaders in breed associations and their communities.

He's excited about the future.

"Where I see the biggest opportunity is jobs in the dairy industry," he said. "We need to provide qualified graduates."

About 40 percent to 50 percent of NICC dairy graduates return home and modernize their family farms.

"As Jed Becker, former Dairy Foundation president says, when a student goes home and the family modernizes their operation, it's a family farm saved for another generation," Lawstuen said. "That is still our main focus, but I think we're also in the infancy of robotics and we're positioned to provide more graduates for that industry as well as the feed, milk quality and genetics industries."
